Lancashire Central Hockey League was formed in 1930 by Thomas Arnold Hart, as the Leyland and District Hockey League. However, to let more teams in the season 1931-32 it changed its name to Lancashire Central Women's Hockey League. It is still in existence today.

Although not the oldest League in the country it is still an important League in the history of women's league hockey which is only just beginning to come to light. It had many successful teams with Leyland Motors being one of the most important as they won the English Cup, a cup played for by teams in the leagues who were members of the English Ladies Hockey Leagues Association (E.L.H.L.A.), on a number of occasions. The League also won the Caley Trophy, an inter League Tournament played for by League teams in the E.L.H.L.A., at least 4 times.

May Helme and the Lancashire Central Hockey League

May Helme played for Preston and District who played in the Lancashire Central League. However in September 1939 an article in the Lancashire Daily Post says she had been recruited for Dick, Kerrs. However, due to the war it may be she did not play for them and joined Preston after the war.

She played on a number of occasions for the League team but never played an international match for the English Ladies Hockey Leagues Association (E.L.H.L.A.) representative team. Her career seems to have stretch over a long period from the 1930s into the 1950s. Like so many of the sports people at the time maybe she lost her best years to the war.

BALSHAW'S "A" appeared to have a commanding lead in Division I at the beginning of 1938, but defeats against Kerr's and Leyland Motors robbed them of advantage and they finished the season runnersup to Kerr's, who were one point better. 








Lancashire Central League XI 1951 including M. Helme.

Garstang Ladies Hockey Club - History

Garstang Ladies Hockey Club was formed in 1958 and is believed to be one of the longest running clubs in Central Lancashire. The original playing kit was white shirts, navy blue skirts and white stockings. Annual subscriptions were £ 1 and 5 shillings for over 21s; 15 shillings for over 18's and 10 shillings for U18s, The team played on grass at Garstang Cricket Club, which cost £10/season to rent and were responsible for marking out and maintaining the pitches.

1969 was a very successful season for the club, with the 1st XI winning the Glaxo Tournament at Ulverston, the Bury Tournament, Caley Trophy, Lancashire Club Tournament, Lishman Cup, Grant Shield and the Division 1 Championship. 106 goals were scored with only 15 against. A 2nd XI was also entered into the league.

There were many organised fundraising activities, including the annual jumble sale / raffle / sports day and sponsored cricket match / sale of newspaper.

In 1972 the club changed to an all red kit. The 2nd XI were asked to dye their white shirts red and 20lbs of Bri-nylon wool was bought from the market for one of the players to knit red sweaters and everyone would sew their own up!

Unfortunately in 1994 the club had to leave its roots in search of an Astroturf pitch; despite extensive discussions to this day one still hasn't materialised in Garstang! The Club played at Stanley Park then Penwortham Leisure Centre, before settling at Preston Sports Arena, which has been its base since 2000.

In 1999 the 1st XI finished 3rd in the Premier league and the 2XI were successful in promotion to Division 2. This was followed by Lishman Cup glory in 2000 - an honour which the Club had not achieved for over 30 years.

In 2007 the 2nd XI secured promotion to Division 1; and in 2008, the 1st XI secured promotion to the Premier Division. The Club has gone from strength to strength, attracting new players all the time. As a result of this, a 3rd XI was entered in the league for the first time in the Club's history. This coincided with the 50th anniversary of the Club, which was celebrated in June 2008 with a celebratory match on grass at Garstang Cricket Club between current and former players followed by a BBQ.
